Getting here

The City has plenty of train, tube and bus links but please check for service changes.

There will be significant road closures and restrictions in place to accommodate the procession so drivers should check in advance. cityoflondon.gov.uk/roadclosures

Seeing it all

Get to the procession route early if you want a good view, especially if you have kids. Busiest parts are likely to be around St Paul's and Mansion House but Cheapside, Fleet Street Victoria Embankment and Queen Victoria Street are usually clearer.

Best views guaranteed

Why not make sure you get a clear view and a seat from which to enjoy the whole Show by buying tickets for the grandstands? These allow you to enjoy unrestricted views of the procession as it travels to St Paul's from New Change right in front of your eyes. Fully wheelchair accessible spaces are also available but book early as tickets go fast. Ticket prices include a copy of the official Show programme.

Guildhall Art Gallery

See Victorian and Pre-Raphaelite masterpieces dating from 1670 to present. Established in 1886 as 'a Collection of Art Treasures worthy of the capital city,' the Gallery is home to a range of paintings documenting London's dramatic history. Family activities will be available for all to enjoy. Please note, access to the Gallery is only available from 12noon.

The City Centre

Home to the City's official architectural model, The City Centre is the place to come to learn all about the built environment of the Sauare Mile past, present and future. Families can get creative with a free design workshop inspired by 2.000 years of architecture. Open 10am-5pm.

City of London **Heritage Gallery**

Feast your eyes on rarely-seen-before items held in trust for the nation. The current display looks at the election of the Lord Mayor in November 1918 against a backdrop of fast moving events in Europe.

City of London Police Museum

Journey through the history of the City Police - from beginnings, to present day and into the future – and see some precious and unusual objects along the way.

London's Roman Amphitheatre

Step into Roman ruins where crowds once gathered to watch wild animal fights, public executions and aladiatorial combat.



Fantastic Beasts: Wizarding **World Wands** supporting Lumos

As excitement builds for the 16 November release of Fantastic Beasts: The Crimes of Grindelwald. nine aiant wands will be displayed on Peter's Hill. Created in association with J.K. Rowling's charity Lumos, which shines a light on children in orphanaaes around the world, the art installation reflects the magic of Harry Potter and Fantastic Beasts here in London.

9 Tower Bridge will transport you to Victorian London, telling the story of the City's defining landmark from the very beginning. Uncover the history of the world's most famous bridge: hear the stories of the architects. engineers, labourers, divers, cooks and coal stokers behind its construction along with the people who have operated the Bridge from 1894 to the present day. Immerse yourself in the engineering: get up close to the original steam engines, coal burners and accumulators once used to raise the Bridge's 1,200ton bascules. And watch City life unfold in dramatic panorama from its high-level Walkways and Glass Floors. 40,000 people cross Tower Bridge each day. Now you can see inside it.

The role of the Lord Mayor

The annually elected Lord Mayor heads the City of London Corporation. This is the governing body of the City, or Square Mile. It is dedicated to a vibrant and thriving City, supporting a diverse and sustainable London within a globally-successful UK. On a day-to-day basis this means providing local government and policing services; it also means supporting and promoting the City as the financial and commercial heart of the UK; and it means supplying a host of services beyond its statutory duties and the Square Mile that benefit London and the UK.





The City Corporation has three main aims:

Supporting a thriving economy

The Lord Mayor plays a key role in this area, working with the organisation as a whole, to ensure the City remains a global hub for finance and professional services. commerce and culture. As an international ambassador for UK-based financial and businessrelated services, the Lord

Mayor spends around 90 days a year leading business delegations abroad to key markets and financial centres. This involves meeting those at the highest level of business and aovernment and promoting the UK's unrivalled legal and regulatory framework and access to global markets. Foreign dignitaries and

heads of state are likewise welcomed by the Lord Mayor to the UK on behalf of the government. As a trusted voice for industry, the Lord Mayor presses Westminster and Whitehall for what businesses need to thrive. such as access to skills and talent. Businesses, in turn. are encouraged to earn trust by being socially and environmentally responsible.



The Museum of London

Step inside the

Museum of London for an unforgettable journey through the capital's everchanging history. Discover London during prehistoric, Roman and medieval times, stroll through the streets of Victorian London and explore the 20th century including the Suffragettes, the Blitz and the swinging 60s. Discover the different sides of London after dark in the major photography exhibition, London Nights, before it ends on 11 November. On the day of the Lord Mayor's Show, you can also join the museum's free family day to mark 100 years of remembrance of the First World War. Explore what life was like in London from 1914-1918; meet a munitions worker, hear about a zeppelin raid on London and much more at hands-on workshops, craft activities and storytelling sessions.

Climb the Monument's 311 steps to enjoy 360° views from one of London's most historic attractions. Built to commemorate one of the most renowned events in the City's history, the Great Fire of London, this colossal column stands 202ft high and remains the tallest isolated stone column in the world. Designed by Sir Christopher Wren and Dr Robert Hooke, The Monument features a stunning stone carving celebrating the resilience of a city which rose from the ashes.

The Cathedral will be open with free entry for all to enjoy throughout the day (including the Galleries). Children of all ages will be enthralled by the Grand Organ of St Paul's, with five keyboards and more than 7,000 pipes, as it plays with its full range of musical voices under Wren's great Dome. Complete your day with their flagship service of Choral Evensong at 3.15pm led by the world's greatest cathedral choir.

The Barbican is Europe's largest multi-arts and conference venue and a world-class arts and learning organisation. The architecturally renowned centre comprises the Barbican Hall, the Barbican Theatre, the Pit, Cinemas One, Two and Three, Barbican Art Gallery, a second gallery The Curve, foyers and public spaces, a library, Lakeside Terrace, a glasshouse conservatory, conference facilities and three restaurants.
